Course Information

Class Structure:

This course is taught on-line at the student's pace on a weekly basis. Every week will cover approximately one chapter. Weekly activities/quizzes cover each chapter and there will be three segmented exams throughout the term.

Catalogue Description:

This course introduces students to the art of grant writing for professional, non-profit and arts enterprise organizations. The course explores way to apply for and acquire funds from both public and private granting bodies, i.e.: government agencies, foundations and the like. The course focuses on the important of grant administration, stewardship, program evaluation, data analysis and the role of board and staff members in developing effective strategies for philanthropic success. This course also examines internal and external barriers that organizations face in procuring fund development. Additionally, students learn the importance of relationship building, planned giving and fundraising within a variety of enterprise careers. F, S

Course Objectives:

(1) Provide an overview of theories of grant writing and management. (2) Improve knowledge and understanding of the grant writing process and grant management. (3) Identify and delineate outputs and outcomes of specific approaches to grant management and generate new, innovative methods to enhancing organization likelihood of receiving grant-based awards. (4) Improve critical thinking and analytical skills to prepare for a management position in a nonprofit organization.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students are expected to be able to: (1) Explain theories of modern grant writing and management based on advanced readings and critiques of current literature in the field. (2) Be proficient in the nuances of grant writing and management processes. (3) Present successful approaches to grant-based awards and describe innovative approaches to grant management. (4) Analyze, think and write critically about the process

surrounding grant-based awards. (5) Understand the use of grant funding as a source of financial capital for nonprofit organizations and the related business policy and processes and needed.


