Fulfilling her internship requirement, Wall Fellow marine science major Samantha Wright spent six months this year in California. Splitting her time between Catalina Island and Los Angeles, Sam was one of eight students selected to be part of the Summer Undergraduate Research Experience or SURE program. In her research, she sought to determine the diversity and abundance of zooplankton and to relate it to chlorophyll levels and moon phases. She also conducted extensive research on microorganisms living within coral polyps. At the end of her experience, she gave a formal presentation to faculty, donors and students at the University of Southern California. She is looking forward to continuing her education and is currently applying to Ph.D. programs at the University of Southern California, Scripps Institution of Oceanography and Stanford.
