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Citations are listed on a new page of your paper. The heading for this page is References with only the first letter capitalized and, centered at the top of the page. Arrange entries in alphabetical order by the author's surname (last name). Double-space all reference entries (with exception to some theses and dissertations). These references are in hanging indent format, which means that the first line of each reference is set flush left and subsequent lines are indented.
