Course Description: CHIN211 Intermediate Chinese II (3 credits) (Prereq: CHIN 210, or

permission of the instructor) This course refines and further develops the fundamental language skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) in preparation for advanced-level course work. Using Mandarin Chinese as their primary language, students engage in activities at novice-mid proficiency level, necessary to function successfully in everyday situations in Chinese culture. The course also helps them gain more and in-depth knowledge of different aspects of Chinese culture and society. Students learn to discuss in Chinese a wide range of topics relating to social life such as seeing a doctor, asking and giving directions, and renting and leasing an apartment. F,S, Su.

About CHIN 211

Course Objectives:

CHIN 211 will:

- Train students to function appropriately in Chinese culture using Mandarin Chinese as their primary language.
- Improve students' skills in Mandarin Chinese to communicate across ethnic, cultural, and ideological boundaries.
- Deepen students' understanding of Chinese behavioural culture and related thought patterns.

General Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of the course, students will be able to perform the following tasks at an intermediate proficiency level:

- Comprehend paragraph-length speech concerning a variety of themes and topics relating to social life (school orientation day, dining at a restaurant, seeing a doctor, renting and leasing an apartment, etc.).
- Successfully handle a wide range of task-oriented and social functions pertaining to the topics listed above, such as participating in casual conversations.

- Identify key facts and some details in conversational and descriptive materials on such topic areas as listed above.
- Write simple letters and essays concerning school life as well as social experiences.
- Use cultural knowledge to enable successful interaction with speakers of Mandarin Chinese.

Course Requirements:

In order to ensure that your learning is enjoyable and fruitful, it is important that you meet the requirements and follow the rules outlined below.

- 1. Attendance and Participation (20%). Class attendance and participation are crucial. Part of your grade is based on attendance and absences count against your final grade. You cannot participate if you are not present, so attendance counts as a prerequisite to participation. You may miss 3 classes without it affecting your final grade. In order to progress in understanding and speaking Chinese, you must hear and speak it on a regular basis. You will receive a 15 pt. performance grade once a week (5 pt. per class). These scores will be averaged at the end of the semester to obtain your final participation grade.
- 2. <u>Daily Homework (15%).</u> Completing your daily assignments on time is essential for your success in this class. These assignments include:
 - 1) <u>Preview exercises</u>: you will watch tutorials/presentations about important vocabulary and grammar made by your instructor in order to acquire necessary knowledge and skills in Mandarin Chinese. You will then complete pre-class assignments to practice what you have learned.
 - 2) <u>Pronunciation exercises:</u> *Pinyin* (the romanization of Chinese pronunciation) is the foundation of speaking Chinese. You will spend the entire semester learning and practicing the *pinyin* system by watching online tutorials, reading pronunciation strategies, and completing listening comprehension exercises and recording assignments.
 - 3) <u>Practice of essential characters:</u> 汉字(hanzi) or characters are the building blocks of the Chinese writing systems. Throughout the semester, you will learn approximately two hundred characters. You will watch tutorials about the stroke orders and the meanings embodied in the characters and then practice assigned characters in your workbook.
- 3. <u>Preparation checks (10%).</u> You are required to preview the materials covered in each session. There will be **approximately twelve** regular preparation checks, worth 20 pts. each, throughout the semester, as indicated on the schedule. You are allowed to drop the lowest grade at the end of the semester. The purpose of these checks is to verify that you have prepared the lesson for that day by doing the required assignments the night before. Thus, these checks are not meant to be difficult. Each check will take no more than 5

minutes of class time. At the end of the semester, you may drop your lowest grade. **Makeup checks will not be administrated.**

- 4. <u>Chapter Tests (15%).</u> There will be 3 chapter tests and no final exam. Upon the completion of two lessons, there will be a chapter test.
- 5. <u>Mid-term oral exam (10%)</u>. In order to improve your speaking, you need to prepare a presentation on a given topic in <u>Chinese</u>. You are expected to demonstrate your knowledge and understanding of the Chinese language and culture in a creative way in terms of the form and content of your presentations. More details will be given in class.
- 6. <u>Final oral project (10%).</u> In this group project, you will be divided into several groups. You need to work together to make a video about a given topic. You will receive both an individual grade and a group grade.
- 7. <u>Cultural Projects & Events (12%).</u> Learning interesting facts about Chinese culture and making cultural comparisons between Chinese culture and your own is a vital part of this course. You will have the opportunity to participate in the following activities and events to deepen your understanding of Chinese culture.
 - 1) <u>Culture highlights reports (5 %)</u>: At the end of each lesson, there is a text about a specific aspect of Chinese culture such as the Chinese naming traditions and the ranking system in Chinese family. You will find related articles and videos on Moodle that supplement these texts to help you better understand the topic. You need to write your reflections on the materials that you read/watched based on the questions given by your instructor. This assignment is completed <u>in English</u> and will be graded based on the accuracy, the depth, and the creativity of your work.
 - 2) <u>Culture Presentation</u> (4%): You will conduct research on selected topics about Chinese culture. The topics will be given on the first day of class and you will give a group presentation <u>in English</u> on the marked dates. More details will be given in class.
 - 3) <u>Cultural Activities/Events (3%):</u> Throughout the semester, there will be several cultural events relating to Chinese customs, traditions, and arts such as Chinese holiday celebrations, Chinese film showings, and Calligraphy Night. I will announce the events at the beginning of the semester. You are encouraged to come to all of them and you need to attend at least two events to receive 3% of your final grade.
- 8. <u>Compositions (8%).</u> You will need to type out two short compositions using Chinese characters on the given topics. More details will be given in class.

Useful resources to learn and practice Chinese: In addition to the aforementioned activities, you have two other options to improve your skills in Mandarin Chinese.

• 中文角 (Chinese Conversation Table): the conversation table takes place every week and you are welcome to join the group to practice what you have learned in class and to learn more about Chinese society and culture.

- •often arrives more than 5 minutes late for class and/or often leaves 5 min. or more before class ends.
- •does not fulfill the homework and class requirements,
- •does not listen while others speak,
- •shows lack of respect towards the professor and his/her fellow students, uses a laptop for non class-related matters, uses a cellular phone to send text messages, etc.,
- •does not contribute much to getting the task done in pair or group work,
- •contributes to the failure of activities by not completing small group or individual assignments,
- •works on assignments for other classes in Spanish class,
- •uses more English than Spanish when speaking with the instructor or class members,
- •does not seem to do his/her best in speaking Chinese in class.
