International Trip Reflection by Lainey Lewis

After many meetings and countless group discussions during the semester about what to pack, how to travel and what to do, my Wall Fellows classmates and I were ready to set sail on our international trip this past summer. With nine days in Reykjavik, Iceland, four days in Dublin, Ireland, and five days in London, England, we had an amazing whirlwind of an adventure.

When we finally landed in Keflavik, we were amazed to see that the landscape appeared to be that of a different planet. With jagged rock structures covered with green moss, the terrain was unlike anything we had ever seen. We took the Flybus to Reykjavik where we checked into Eyja Guldsmeden Hotel, which is owned and operated by Coastal alumni Linda Johannsdottir and Ellert Finnbogason. After being mesmerized by the sustainable hotel, we met up with Kjartan Sigurdsson, Drofin and Bergthora Guðnadóttir,



also alumni of Coastal Carolina University. We were pleased and excited to be touring the city with native Icelanders.

While in Iceland, we were able to spend time onsite with our companies. When it came time for our final presentations, I knew how important it was that we do well, not just for ourselves, but as representatives of the University and the Wall Fellows program. I could not have been more excited about how well we all did. We finally knew what it was like to plan, produce and deliver a completed product for a company confidently.



Not everything in Iceland was all business. During our stay, my class went on some pretty amazing outdoor tours, the first of which was an ice-caving tour called "Volcanic Veins." We also toured the Golden Circle, where we saw glaciers, waterfalls, lakes, mountains, and the rift where the North American and Eurasian plate meet.

On the second leg of our trip, we traveled to Dublin, Ireland. One highlight of the trip was that we had the opportunity to tour Google Docks by Coastal alumnus Johannes Frederking. We all were excited to learn about Google and see firsthand the business culture within the company. On our roaming days, we were able to tour Kilmainham Gaol, the infamous jail where leaders of the Easter Rising were imprisoned. We were also able tour the towns of Kilkenny, Wicklow and Glendalough.

Highlights of the London trip were touring St. Paul's Cathedral and the London Eye. During our time in London, we also met with many business representatives, including Henry Dannemann from Marsh & McLennan, Tom Pountney from Lloyds of London and Ben Elder from Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (RICS). We had a wonderful time learning about the different businesses and feel that we have a better understanding of these disciplines.

I felt that this trip helped me understand the international business community, as well as the cultural differences that exist between a select European countries and the United States. My newfound perspective on international relationships and practices have broadened my career outlook. My classmates and I are grateful for the opportunity to expand our global perspectives.

Location: Nashville, Tenn. Duration: June-August 2016



Turner Construction is one of the largest construction companies in the United Stations and averages 1,500 projects every year. During her internship, Beatris worked as an accounting intern focusing on billing proofs, invoices and cost reporting. "I had a great time working as an accounting intern for Turner Construction in their Nashville office. I was pleasantly surprised by the great environment in the company and one thing that stuck in my mind was the great chemistry and connection between the teams I was able to work with." Internship Spotlight: Emilie-Kate Tavernier

Company: University of California-Riverside

Location: Riverside, Cali.
Duration: June-August, 2016

During the summer of 2016, Wall Fellows Class of 2018 member Emilie-Kate Tavernier had the opportunity to learn more about her passion and take part in things that helped her make a decision about future plans through a program offered at the University of California. As an undergraduate research assistant, Tavernier studied in the Center for Plant Cell Biology. She was a part of the Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program. Eugene Nothnagel was the professor Tavernier studied with while in Southern California. During the 10 months Tavernier studied at the university, she learned about gas chromatographmass spectrometry. A typical work day, was anywhere from eight to 12 hours. Experiments were performed to prepare plant cell wall samples for the mass spectrometer. "After the experience, I feel much more confident working in a lab and I truly enjoy scientific research," Tavernier says. After graduation, Tavernier is confident she will attend graduate school and earn her Ph.D. in plant molecular biology.



Project Update: Food Recovery Network



Coastal Carolina University's Food Recovery Network is up and running this semester. To kick off the semester, they donated 61 pounds of food to the men's shelter in Myrtle Beach. To date, the Food Recovery Network at CCU has donated 204 pounds of food. They recover/collect food after football games and occasionally on Fridays from places on campus. CCU's Food Recovery Network has set a goal of 1,000 pounds of food they would like to donate.

Project Introduction: Clothing for the Homeless

This semester, Mickayla Smith '18 has introduced a new project for the Wall Fellows Program called Clothing for the Homeless. In this effort, we are working toward building a closet of professional attire for homeless people to use for job interviews and other life events to help them get back on their feet. Mickayla recalls an event that made her want to do this project. "I remembered reading a gut-wrenching story about a homeless man who wandered into a retail store for men, trying to buy some clothing. He said that the employees would not help him and practically told him to leave. The manager insisted the man be helped; he wanted clothes for an interview so he could get a job. The manager let him take the clothes for free and said that if he didn't get the job, to return to his sore and he would have a position there. The homeless man ended up working at the store with the nice manager, and a few years later, was manager himself." She says that after being accepted into the Wall Fellows program, she felt compelled to bring this project to life. "I remembered that homeless man and how all he needed was an outfit to attend an interview. Given the large amounts of homeless in this area, it made sense to try and help them. I want to help them start again, give them the ability to start making strides toward a better future."

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
