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Course Description

GEOG 428 Geography of Oceania. (3 credits) This course examines both the physical and cultural geography of Oceania including, Australia, New Zealand, and the Pacific Islands. This course explores the region's physical geography as a foundation for understanding spatial patterns and processes related to migration, cultural identity, demographics, religions and belief systems, mythology, economics, politics, sustainability, and human-environment interactions. Course Objectives:

- Identify the spatial extent of Oceania, regional divisions, and important islands, mountains, and cities.
- Investigate the geological, climatic, and biogeographical processes that have interacted to form the physical geography of Oceania.
- Investigate natural resource limitations in Oceania and the importance of sustainable practices in the region.
- Examine the impacts of human activity on the natural environment in Oceania.
- Examine how the physical geography of Oceania influences the culture, economics, and politics of the region.
- Identify historical and current patterns of migration and demographic shifts as they relate to cultural identity today.
- Examine mythology and historical belief systems practiced and current influences of organized religions in the region.
- Examine the role of Oceania in the global economy.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Demonstrate the ability to locate, analyze, synthesize, and evaluate information on a map for the Oceania region.
- Assess connections between the physical geography of the region and its culture, economics, politics, natural resource limitations, and role in the global economy.

• Demonstrate the ability to use library, web, and other scholarly sources for research related to contemporary cultural and human-environment issues in the Oceania region.

All written assignments must be typed in double-spaced format with 12 point font size, and written using college-level grammar and organization. Written assignments will be submitted via Moodle in a current version of MS Word or Adobe PDF format. All written assignments will be submitted through Turn It In (TII), a plagiarism checker. A general rubric will be available for the journal article submissions (the topic/focus will change for each). A rubric will also be available for the research paper.

Requirements and Guidelines for JA's (Journal Article Submissions)

Throughout the semester you will be responsible for finding current news articles in newspapers, magazines, or the internet that are relevant to each of the four sections of our Geography of Oceania Course. You will submit this assignment through the Turn It In Link (TII) within Moodle. Your upload should be as a pdf or doc file. The four articles you will be finding throughout the semester for Russia will include: Physical Geography; Historical/Political Geography; Cultural/Social Geography; and Economic Geography.

There is a rubric available attached to each JA assignment and one is available for you to view 24/7 within the TII link. For the rubric you will be graded/marked based upon categories as follows: formatting; organization; citation; student responses; grammar and composition; deadlines/times met; article selected within the last 6 months; three connections clearly made and explained to course material; and two geography themes clearly defined and explained.

Map Test

You will have a map test to complete after the physical geography module for our course. You'll be identifying regional divisions, important islands, mountains, and cities.

Class Activities

In class activities may include using Google Earth, government websites for the region, and watching documentaries for the region.

Midterm Exam

The Midterm Exam will cover the Physical Geography and History of Oceania. Questions may be multiple choice, T/F, and/or short essay.

Individual Final Research Paper

During the semester you will be provided guidelines and a rubric for the final research paper. You will select one country to research which must be approved by the instructor. The paper will be 6-8 pages in length and must cover the physical, historical, cultural, and economic geographies of your approved country. Your research must include scholarly journals and books for the region and may include current news sources when applicable.
