COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course provides an introduction, overview, and survey of Criminology and the American criminal justice system. Examining the role, development, policies and management of different public agencies and organizations that constitute the criminal justice system. Emphasis is also placed on the study of current and future critical criminological issues such as due process, discretion in the administration of justice, community policing, police ethics, domestic violence intervention, probation and parole effectiveness and correctional issues.

Upon completion of this course students will be expected to: Identify and critically assess ethical issues in criminal justice. Apply concepts about human and social behavior to particular questions or situations related to criminal justice.

- 2) An increased understanding of the current initiatives in the criminal justice system, and the additional topics that are covered separate from the book.
